Mayor Chris Riley welcomed everyone and asked Councilor Matthew Hodde to lead the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mayor Riley asked for all cell phones to be silenced. Mayor Riley let all guests know that the City Council appreciates them being here this evening but asked them to please step into the lobby if they wanted to have a conversation with their neighbor so it doesn't distract those around them or interfere with the meeting or recording. Lastly, Mayor Riley asked that all comments from the floor be held until after the City Council has heard the item, discussed the item and those wanting to make comments have been called upon and have stepped up to the podium.

PRESENTATIONS

Economic Prosperity in Leon Valley. Presented by Business Relations Director, William Cox (Business Relations Director, William Cox)

Business Relations Specialist William Cox presented this item and provided information to the Leon Valley City Council concerning current businesses and economic prosperity in the City. Council feedback is important so that the Business Relations Department remains

efficient, productive, and meets the needs of the citizens and business community. Business Relations Specialist Cox used *Knapheide Manufacturing* as an example of a business in Leon Valley and how the City contributes the best way possible to their business needs.

- Ann Sawyer: Expressed her excitement about the workforce program.

Councilor Donna Charles thanked Mr. Cox for the time he spent putting together this report.

Councilor Catherine Rodriguez asked if there will be room for expansion as he mentioned that the maximum will be 20 employees. Business Relations Specialist Cox said there is room for expansion behind where they are. However, he is not sure if they plan to expand anytime soon.

Councilor Will Bradshaw asked what exactly they plan to build. Business Relations Specialist Cox clarified that the toolbox (commercial bed) for commercial trucks will be manufactured someplace else. Mr. Cox explained that this toolbox is used by electricians or plumbers and that the box will be brought in from the manufacture place to Leon Valley for sales and installation.

Councilor Hodde said, “Fantastic, I like what I hear, your ideas and the staff’s ideas are very pro-business which I like. Thank you for the presentation.”

Mayor Riley asked when did Knapheide moved in. Business Relations Specialist Cox said that they moved in sometime in November of 2019.

Leon Valley First Net Presentation (LVPD Assistant Chief Ruben Saucedo)

LVPD Chief Joseph Salvaggio and LVPD Assistant Chief Ruben Saucedo presented an update on FirstNet, a communications platform that keeps us connected. Assistant Chief Saucedo said he first learned about this software when he was at the FBI Academy in Quantico, Virginia and shared how FirstNet is a Congressional mandate following the attacks of 911. During the 911 tragedy, there were crashes on all the telecommunication systems that weren’t able to handle everything that was happening that day. Since then, Congress asked for a system that would keep first responders connected.

Assistant Chief Saucedo gave a brief background on how and when FirstNet was first presented to City Council and then implemented for usage. Assistant Chief Saucedo showed a short video clip which demonstrates how all Leon Valley Departments make use of the software, but most important, how it benefits the City. Assistant Chief Saucedo also informed Council that Leon Valley is the first small City in this region to use it. FirstNet thinks it’s great that Leon Valley took the lead to make use of this powerful tool. FirstNet uses Leon Valley as an example on how the communication platform works for other cities of our size.

- Kathy Hill: Asked if FirstNet has anything to do with the traffic lights when responding to an emergency.
 - Assistant Chief Saucedo said it's completely separate. The traffic lights are controlled by the state. FirstNet is just to keep all first responders connected.

Councilor Matthew Hodde said that "this is very cool" and asked if the video was available on YouTube. Assistant Chief Saucedo said, "Yes, the video has been released nationally and it is on YouTube."

Councilor Donna Charles congratulated Assistant Chief Saucedo.

Presentation of the Certification of Sufficiency of Recall Petitions (Saundra Passailaigue, City Secretary)

City Secretary Saundra Passailaigue presented the Certification of Sufficiency of Recall Petitions.

- Richard Blackmore: Asked if there is a way of verifying the names on the petitions. "None of my neighbors got contacted about the petition", he said.
 - City Secretary Passailaigue asked for clarification and asked if he wanted to know if some of those signatures were forged. Mr. Blackmore responded "yes". City Secretary Passailaigue then said that she will defer the question to the City Attorney.
 - City Attorney Habib H. Erkan Jr. said, "The presumption is that the signatures are valid if they meet the prerequisites of the statute of the Charter which they did."
- William Johnson: Asked for clarification: "there were over 800 signatures submitted for each recall petition and you stopped counting when you reached the 500 limit. In essence, there were another 240 for each of the petitions that were not even looked at, is what I figured based on your statement, is that true?"
 - City Secretary Passailaigue said, "Yes Sir, for Councilor Alcocer, there were 258 unchecked. Now, that does not mean those were valid signatures. As I said earlier, just on hers alone, there were four (4) duplicates and several of those were not even in the district, several of them are also not registered so we don't really discuss the ones that weren't checked because it's not to say they were valid or not. We are only required 500 signatures per the charter so that's what we discuss. On Councilor Charles, there was an extra 250 that was unchecked."
- Richard Blackmore: Spoke in regards to the petition that was represented to some people. "A recall was going on for the Mayor and Mr. Bradshaw. Misrepresenting the petition", he said. "Is there no way of verifying other than what you got?" he asked.
 - City Secretary Passailaigue said, "Mr. Blackmore, what I've got is what I've got."
- Leslie Bacon: Asked Mr. Blackmore "who has been saying that there is falsification

of this going on?”

- Mayor Riley said that is not appropriate and that the question must be asked to Ms. Passailaigue or perhaps ask Mr. Blackmore in private.
- Josh Stevens: Thanked staff on behalf of the hundreds of citizens that signed. “We know that there’s a lot of work that has to go into verifying those as we try to verify them ourselves and to Mr. Blackmore’s comment, all the petitions are notarized and so it would be perjury if there’s falsification on the documents, so I would encourage you to tell those people to reach out to the Police Department or the District Attorney’s office or whoever to report those [...].”
- Phillip Riddle: Asked if someone in the future could outline what the procedures are. Mayor Riley said “the timeline is what I think you’re asking for”, Mr. Riddle nodded yes.

Councilor Matthew Hodde asked what happens next. City Secretary Passailaigue read Section 6.04 of the Charter aloud.

Mayor Riley asked City Attorney if there’s a certain date for calling the election. City Attorney Erkan said he’s not sure on an exact date but that “the Council can call the election at the next meeting.” Mr. Erkan pointed two things: “because of new statutory changes, you will have to have some type of citizens to be heard provision even though your charter prohibits it. The statute just changed and you have to comply with the statute.” City Attorney Erkan read section 6.06 aloud so that everyone understands. “That would be your next step, to order your election”, he concluded.

Councilor Will Bradshaw asked to be sure the election gets put on the next agenda. City Secretary Passailaigue said the election was already planned to be on the next agenda and that City Council now will need to wait the five (5) days.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

City Manager Kelly Kuenstler reminded everyone that the City Manager’s Report is posted on the website as well as placed on the table in the foyer for all interested. City Manager Kuenstler then supplemented that report with new information with: a) The infamous dog “Houndini” has been captured and relocated-this was the dog that was wondering around on Settlers Ridge. b) On behalf of the Police Department, we want to again sincerely thank citizens, employees and Council Members who contributed to Blue Santa-over 600 children benefited, including 150 at Methodist Children’s Hospital. Councilor Alcocer went to that one-that was a big one. Sgt. Kasey Burleson worked tirelessly and put in the most hours but over a thousand hours were donated by staff to ensure this program was such a huge success. We also had City Council participation at all events, but the Police Department asked that I specifically acknowledge Dr. Catherine Rodriguez who attended all but 1 event-she did not simply make an appearance but she worked hard at every event. c) Can I get a consensus on how you would like the room set up for Saturday’s presentation on the

changes proposed in the Home Rule Charter.

ACM/HR Director Crystal Caldera said that if they wish to live stream it then it cannot be set-up to be in the floor, Council would have to sit at the dais. There was a consensus to leave the Council Chamber as it is as the meeting will be live streamed.

d) A special E-news went out this afternoon reminding citizens about this Saturday's HRC Workshop, it's placement on the January 21st agenda and Town Hall Meeting. e) It's Time Texas- the community challenge we do annually-started yesterday. There are some flyers out on the table and information regarding this will be in the coming Friday's e-news. f) The LVFD will be participating in the Cystic Fibrosis Tower Climb on the 25th of January (during our Town Hall Meeting as usual). We will be rooting on in spirit as we gather input from our citizens. g) Thank you to our Library Staff, EMS Staff for assisting an elderly lady with Alzheimer or Dementia yesterday find her family- her family was grateful for our rapid response and safe delivery of her mother.

- Pat Martinez: Thanked Public Works for the Christmas lights decoration outside the Leon Valley Public Library and Community and Conference Center grounds.

REGULAR AGENDA

Discussion on the Itemization and Summary of Attorney Fees Paid to Date for the Following: Martinez 3.12 Hearing (Ryan Henry); Martinez v. City of Leon Valley (Ryan Henry); and Ethics Complaint Against Mayor Riley (Alan Bojorquez) as Requested by Mayor Chris Riley (M&C # 2020-01-07-06 V. Wallace)

Finance Director Vickie Wallace presented this item to discuss on the itemization and summary of attorney fees paid to date for the following: Martinez 3.12 Hearing (Ryan Henry); Martinez v. City of Leon Valley (Ryan Henry); and ethics complaint against Mayor Riley (Alan Bojorquez) as requested by Mayor Chris Riley.

Mayor Riley said that she wants to make sure that the citizens know that she tried to avoid more attorney fees and also that she submitted a letter to the Ethics Review Board on December 20, 2019 but has not heard back from the Board just yet. Mayor Riley asked staff to please provide her with a copy of tonight’s Power Point Presentation.

- Leslie Bacon: Asked Councilor Donna Charles what was the complaint about.
 - Mayor Riley said that Council is not allowed to discuss her question as the agenda item is to discuss about attorney fees only.
 - Leslie Bacon asked where she could find out more information on the complaint.
 - City Secretary Sandra Passailaigue said that ethics complaints are confidential.

There was continued discussion.

- Benny Martinez: Spoke regarding the bills that do not match to what was previously presented to everyone.
 - Finance Director Wallace said that she did explain that the numbers had changed from what everyone had seen on July 9th because none of the October bills had gone out to Council and her office was still processing them.
- Olen Yarnell: Asked if the City could please upload this information to the website and/or to the minutes of this meeting so that the information is available for everyone to see.
 - City Manager Kelly Kuenstler said that staff was already instructed to add this Power Point Presentation to the meeting packet, and staff will do so.

Councilor Matthew Hodde asked if the 3.12 Hearing attorney fees were going to be complete after processing what was presented. Finance Director Wallace said that she does not know that information as she doesn't have the Hearing's details and is only responsible for processing what comes to her office. City Manager Kuenstler explained that the 3.12 side of the pie chart is complete and that the Benny Martinez' lawsuit against the City of Leon Valley is still ongoing so the City is still continuing to get bills on that one.

Councilor Matthew Hodde asked if someone can please explain the "\$5,360, 5%, Mayor Riley" section from the pie chart. City Manager Kuenstler explained that Mayor Riley had a lot of questions for the attorney regarding the authority of the City Manager. City Manager Kuenstler also explained that Mayor Riley asked the attorney to conduct an investigation, while civil rights complaints were given to the Mayor. Therefore, per the Mayor's request, the attorney did research and a 7-page memo to the Council which explained the authority; both legally and through the purchasing policy. Mayor Riley clarified that there were other Council members like Councilor Monica Alcocer who were very involved and asked questions as well. City Manager Kuenstler explained that the pie chart is divided into two colors: green and blue. She explained that green represents bills for questions that were made to the attorney by any council member, including the Mayor. The blue represents bills for questions the Mayor had for the attorney in regards to the City Manager's authority.

Councilor Will Bradshaw asked if all bills from the pie chart were paid out of different budgets. City Manager Kuenstler replied and said, "Yes, the \$56,000 was not for the 3.12 Hearing, it was for both, for the investigation and for the 3.12 Hearing." Finance Director Wallace went back to the slide where is showed where the money came from. City Manager Kuenstler explained that most of bills were paid from the Manager and Council budget.

Discussion and Possible Action Regarding the Lion's Roar Policy and Content (M&C # 2020-01-07-07 Mayor Chris Riley)

Mayor Riley asked ACM/HR Director Crystal Caldera to please upload the Lion's Roar Policy so that everyone can see and discuss.

Mayor Riley asked regarding the last Lion's Roar, specifically on page 8, an article from Councilor Donna Charles and page 9, an editorial from the Express News; "how did that come about, it doesn't show who requested that article to be put in this newspaper", Mayor Riley asked. City Manager Kelly Kuentler said "Actually, I don't think that's about policy and content but I'll answer it, I'll defer the City Attorney on that."

Mayor Riley replied and said, "I want to know what policy did you use according to this guideline to put this in the Lion's Roar, I guess that's the question I have." City Manager responded and said, "the policy I used is right in front of you [...] editorial contributions are allowed. I did get the permission of Scott Huddleston who explained to me that he's actually on a board that does the editorials. The person doing the Lion's Roar is new and it was sent to her from Councilor Alcocer but it didn't get attributed to Councilor Alcocer. So, in the upcoming Lion's Roar you will see a box showing whatever page and article it was [...] so that's what we used, number five (5)." City Manager Kuentler also explained that she used number 11, "Final discretion is with the City Manager" to submit Councilor Charles' article. She also explained that she always fact checks everything and that she never removes words because of the word limit.

There was continued discussion.

- Phillip Riddle: Spoke regarding the business ads.
- Olen Yarnell: Spoke and said that showcasing businesses goes against the policy.
- Josh Stevens: Spoke regarding an open record request he made regarding the email Ms. Kuentler received from Mr. Scott Huddleston granting her permission for an editorial contribution and said that he has not received the request so submitted a complaint to the Attorney General's office.
- Robin Johnson: Spoke regarding the word count that is being considered for publications.
- Richard Blackmore: Spoke in support to City Manager Kuentler's work with the Lion's Roar Newsletter and asked not to get discouraged but does recommend to get it out on time.
- Eric Matta: Spoke regarding the ethics complaint against the Mayor and asked if the City Manager would extend the same courtesy to the Mayor as she did with a Council member so that the Mayor can rebuttal to the ethics complaints against her.

Councilor Catherine Rodriguez asked how to fix the policy issue regarding the advertisement of businesses. City Manager Kuentler replied and said that she

recommends for Council to strike the second sentence and number four (4) to clean up the policy.

Councilor Will Bradshaw asked if we have a new publisher as a business advertisement was allowed this time while the policy strictly prohibits promotion of businesses. City Manager Kuenstler said, "Yes, the publisher changed and so did the person putting it together."

Councilor Matthew Hodde agreed and said "we do need to clean this up by striking the second sentence or whatever we decide to do, but I guess there's is a fine line of what 'promotion' is. I don't consider *Knappheide's* business as a promotion or recommendation."

There was continued discussion.

Councilor Will Bradshaw motioned to add an item to the next City Council agenda to review the entire Lion's Roar Policy and Procedures.

Mayor Riley announced that the motion died for a lack of a second.

Councilor Matthew Hodde asked why the item can't just be added to the agenda instead of voting on it. He said that he does agree with Councilor Bradshaw and believes the entire policy must be reviewed. Mayor Riley said that she can and will add it to the next agenda. Mayor Riley also asked Councilor Hodde if he had anything else specifically that he would like to discuss on the Lion's Roar for the next agenda. Councilor Hodde recommends for the policy to allow citizens to submit a positive article on why they like living in Leon Valley. City Manager advised Council that if they wish to allow citizens to contribute to the newsletter, then they must budget for it. City Manager Kuenstler explained that the City is being charged for extra pages and that citizens' articles would add extra pages to the newspaper.

CITIZENS TO BE HEARD

- Eric Matta: Continued the discussion regarding the Lion's Roar Policy and asked the City Attorney if he could give his opinion as City Manager Kuenstler previously said that she was advised by two City Attorneys on it.
 - City Attorney Habib H. Erkan Jr. said that he doesn't believe that it is appropriate for him to comment on the Citizens to be Heard Item.
- Benny Martinez: Spoke in regards to Councilor Catherine Rodriguez' comment about him advocating for businesses while his time as a Councilor.
- Robin Johnson: Spoke and said in relation to the Lion's Roar that, "a single person should not have the final say."
- Richard Blackmore: Spoke in regards to Mr. Martinez' comment about him being business friendly and about Mayor Riley needing to retire or resign.
- Leslie Bacon: Spoke and said that she does not understand why other people are being censored when they speak, while others are allowed to disrespect council members and the Mayor. She also said that the City Manager should get up and

make sure that everyone is treated equal.


- Councilor Donna Charles clarified that the Mayor is the presiding officer for this meeting and that the Mayor is the one who calls for order.
